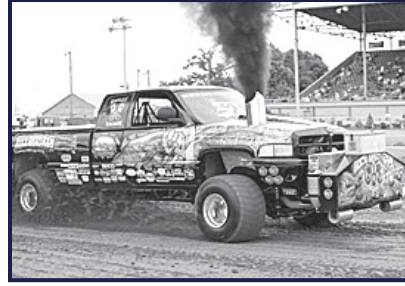

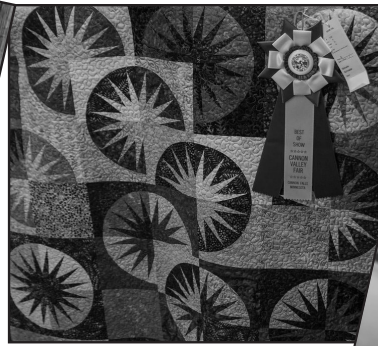

The Directors of the Cannon Valley Fair Association present you with a copy of its Premium List for the 103rd annual Cannon Valley Fair to be held on its grounds at Cannon Falls, MN, July 1, 2, 3 and 4, and wish to extend a hearty welcome to all to attend the fair.

We want you to feel that this is your fair and that your interest and cooperation is necessary for its success. Plan ahead to exhibit in all the departments you can. This year nature again promises to be lavish in her efforts to provide you with the products of the soil. Bring them in and compare your efforts with others. Let us all pull together and make this one of the best fairs in the state.

EMERGENCY

In case of an emergency at the fairgrounds, the fair office, located on the grounds and the first aid building have a public telephone available. Also, the sheriff's posse and Cannon Falls police are on duty throughout the fair and can be contacted. The fair office is open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. The fair phone number is 507-263-3548.

PUBLIC NOTICE TO ALL CONCERNED

1. While the greatest possible care will be executed by the management to protect patrons of the Cannon Valley Fair, each individual will be held personally responsible for his or her actions, and the management will not be accountable or responsible for any injury.
2. The Cannon Valley Fair Agricultural Society management assumes no liability for loss or damage to any property, to the concessionaire, exhibitor or patron due to theft, fire, tornado, weather conditions or other causes.
3. The Directors of the Cannon Valley Fair reserve the right to refuse any offensive or obscene exhibits which, in the judgement of the Fair Board, would be offensive to the general public.
4. Any group or person that conducts a protest action must limit its activity to the location designated by the Cannon Valley Fair Board. The designated location is past the grandstand just east of the Sprint tower on the fairgrounds property. No entrances or exits may be obstructed or limited in any way. No pets allowed.
5. No firearms allowed.
6. It shall be the policy that during the period of the Cannon Valley Fair, no dogs or other pets shall be allowed on the fairgrounds. These are the exceptions:
 - a. Certified service animals or secured animals in training;
 - b. Dogs or other pets may be allowed when part of an exhibition or demonstration authorized by the secretary;
 - c. Carnival owner/operators - dogs must be housed during fair hours.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

These rules have been adopted by the Cannon Valley Fair Board of Directors and no exceptions will be made. Study the rules carefully to avoid errors. Anyone with disagreements or concerns, contact fair board officers.

1. Rules and regulations will be strictly adhered to.
2. All entries must be made to the superintendent of the departments.
3. All exhibits entered must remain in place until 7 p.m. July 4. If exhibits are removed before 7 p.m. on July 4, no premiums will be paid. Building exhibits will be released from 7-9 p.m. on July 4.
4. Premiums will not be awarded on articles that are inferior or not considered worthy by the judge, regardless of lack of competition.
5. All articles exhibited and not called for two days after the fair will be considered donated to the society.
6. Exhibits are allowed from any county in Minnesota.
7. Exhibits must be entered in the name of the bona fide owners. Exhibits must have been raised or made by the exhibitors during the current year.
8. No exhibit will be assigned to a place on the grounds until entry shall have been made. Each entry tag shall be attached to the entry itself, pen, or receptacle in which it is shown.
9. Every article in competition must correspond in number and description within the premium list, and be in its proper class, in order to obtain premiums.
10. All protests and appeals must be made in writing to the secretary before the close of the fair. Any interference by exhibitors to influence or dictate the decisions of the judges will be sufficient cause for excluding the exhibit from competition.
11. Anyone who wishes to give any special premiums must have these awards approved by the secretary or superintendent of the division beforehand to see that they conform to the general classification of the fair association.
12. The association will take every precaution in its power for the preservation of articles and stock on exhibition, but it cannot be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur in the delivery, exhibition or removal of the exhibits.
13. The awards on entries shall be designated by ribbons or cards as follows: First premiums, blue; second, red; third, white; fourth, yellow; fifth, pink; sixth, green; seventh, light green; sweepstakes, purple.
14. When a sum of money is to be paid out pro rata, the apportionment shall be according to the merits of the individual exhibits.
15. No person shall be permitted to distribute advertising matter on the grounds except from their place of business or exhibit. The tacking or posting of any advertisement, bill, card, etc., other than within the space occupied by exhibitors is strictly prohibited. The distribution of hand bills, flyers, heralds, etc., will not, under any circumstances, be permitted. Anyone violating this rule will be liable to a fine or expulsion from the grounds.
16. If the receipts prove insufficient to meet all demands, the society reserves the right to first pay all bona fide expenses of the fair and pay premiums with the balance on hand.
17. No pets allowed on grounds.
18. All checks not cashed within 90 days will be forfeited to the Association.
19. No smoking or alcoholic beverages allowed in the barns.

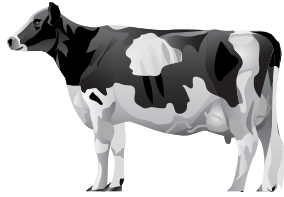
RULES FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

1. No exhibitors of livestock shall be allowed to make more than two entries in an individual lot, one entry per group.
2. Special attention to all livestock exhibitors -- All animal health regulations governing public exhibition of livestock and poultry as specified by the Minnesota Livestock Sanitary Board will be in effect. Official health certificates or forms are required on all livestock. See your local veterinarian for these regulations. All horse exhibitors must bring required proof of current negative Coggin's (within 12 months prior to show date) to the fair. Any animals with warts or ringworm will not be allowed on fairgrounds.
3. All Goats and sheep need to have an USDA scrapies eradication ID tag or tattoo. All goat premise papers to be filed with the fair office according to state regulations.

All Goats and sheep that are within 30 days of giving birth (either before or after birthing) may not be exhibited.
4. All classes of livestock except horses call for registered stock. All cattle and sheep should be accompanied by certificate of registry showing that the animal is properly registered in the studbook, herdbook or flockbook, which is recognized as being authentic for the breed. These papers must be available to the superintendent of the department on request.
5. All cattle must be officially identified with USDA Metal Tag, USDA Orange Brucellosis Vaccination Tag, 840 RFID Tag, or Plastic '41' Tag. <http://www.mn.gov/bah/board/rules/exhibition-rules.html>.
6. Exhibitor must keep their stock, stalls and pens in good, neat condition and open for inspection from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. and must furnish their own roughage, feed, bedding, etc.
7. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the show ring promptly after being called, and any exhibitor failing to comply with this order will be ruled out of competition.
8. Sires, dams and groups entered as such must be owned by the individual or firms exhibiting them, but the progeny of animals may be shown simply as proof of their breeding qualities without such ownership.
9. FFA and 4-H animals may be shown in open class show but must be entered in both classes on entry day.
10. All manure must be hauled to the designated holding area. Wash rack area must be kept clean at all times.
11. Health requirements - Health papers from animals originating outside of MN will be required.
12. All animals are subject to an examination by the onsite veterinarian.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

4-H and FFA members may show only one animal per lot in each division. 4-H members also showing in the FFA division may enter two animals per lot; one 4-H animal and one FFA animal. One animal must be shown by the member and the other animal by another 4-H or FFA member.

1. This department is open only to bona fide members of 4-H and FFA who are conducting their work according to the state rules of the various projects.

2. All exhibits in work must be made in person by the member during the current year.

3. Advanced entries may be sent to club leader or mailed to Kathy Hupf, 4044 260th St. E., Randolph, MN 55065. Please see 4-H entry form on page 19.

4. Bldg. entries may be brought in from 2 to 7 p.m. on June 30. **Building entries can be picked up Wednesday, July 4 – 7-9 p.m.**

5. Free passes will be given to all 4-H and FFA members who exhibit.

6. All projects will be judged on entry day except livestock.

7. Use 4-H or FFA Entry Cards ONLY.

8. The fair management is not responsible for loss or damage to exhibits.

9. Merit awards will be presented in each class if the judge thinks the exhibit so merits.

10. Horse show, 9 a.m. Saturday, June 30.

LIVESTOCK RULES

1. A 4-H or FFA livestock exhibitor may exhibit one entry per lot.

2. All livestock must be in place by 6 p.m. on July 1 and must remain in place until 5 p.m. July 4. Exception: Milking dairy cows will be released following their show.

3. All animals exhibited must comply with all regulations of the State Livestock Sanitary Board. See your local veterinarian.

4. All goats and sheep need to have a USDA scrapies eradication ID tag or tattoo premise paper presented. A copy of all goat premise papers to be filed with the fair office according to state regulations. All goats and sheep that are within 30 days of giving birth (either before or after birthing) may not be exhibited.

5. All cattle must be officially identified with USDA Metal Tag, USDA Orange Brucellosis Vaccination Tag, 840 RFID Tag, or Plastic '41' Tag. <http://www.mn.gov/bah/board/rules/exhibition-rules.html>

6. Each 4-H member must show their own livestock exhibit.

7. Exhibitors should bring their own grain, hay and bedding.

8. Copy of pullorum certificate must be turned in to exhibit building. This copy will not be returned.

9. All manure must be hauled to the designated holding area. Wash rack area must be kept cleaned at all times.

10. Health requirements - Health papers from animals originating outside of MN will be required.

11. All animals are subject to an examination by the onsite veterinarian.

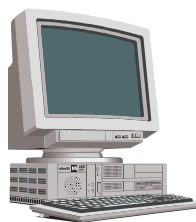

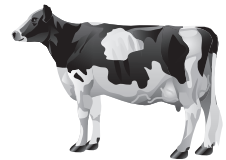

Cloverbud Demonstrations: A show and tell type of demonstration for Kindergarteners-2nd grade, any topic, no time restrictions.

Traditional Demonstrations: 4-H'er demonstrates by him/herself or with another 4-H member on project or topic of their choice. Demonstration time suggestions: Grades 3-5 - 5-8 minutes; Grades 6-8 - 8-10 minutes; Grades 9+ - 10-15 minutes.

Youth-in-Action Demonstration: Individual or multiple 4-H'ers present an informal demonstration on how to do a particular activity and then include the audience. Involving the audience is the primary focus of a Youth-in-Action demonstration. The audience can ask questions at anytime while the 4-H'ers are demonstrating. Suggested length: 15-20 minutes.

Topics for all types of demonstrations are the 4-H'ers choice. Examples: refinishing furniture, healthy exercises, baking cookies, designing a room, clowning, painting, getting your animal ready for the fair, rocketry, how an internal combustion engine works, gardening, forestry, scrapbooking, woodworking, etc.

Requirements:

- Collections shall be contained in a standard 19"x16.5" glass topped case; minimum depth 3". Arrange so that the case may be displayed in a horizontal position. Place project label on lower right corner of glass top.
- Specimens must be collected. Purchased insects are not acceptable.
- Specimens must be properly pinned, with insect pins,



and labeled. The location, date and collector must be included on the labels. All labels should be visible so they can be read. Use permanent ink marker or pencil to write labels. Labels produced by a computer printer are acceptable. Small insects may need to be placed on cardboard points.

- Specimens in general collections must be correctly identified to order; specimens in specialty collections may need to be identified beyond order to family. Use common names when known.
- General insect collections must consist of at least 50 adult insect specimens, representing at least eight orders to be eligible for State Fair.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- General insect collection: 25 specimens for 3rd-5th graders, 50 or more for 6th graders and up.
- A single order collection (i.e. Coleoptera or Lepidoptera), a collection of immature insects, a collection from a particular habitat (i.e. aquatic, forest or prairie) or a collection of economic pests of a specific crop (i.e. insects attacking corn).
- A life history display (i.e. insect life cycle), a scientific investigation (e.g. insect habitats or effects of environment factors on insects), or insects in current events.
- Live projects (e.g. bee or ant colony) will be accepted if the project can be self-sustaining for up to 14 days without special care.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- An educational exhibit to show or explain something 4-H'er made, did or learned or may explore consumer issues, breeds or careers.

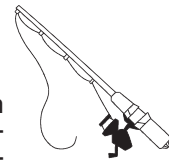

Exhibit Suggestions:

- Display on environmental pollution describing the causes, effects on people and other living things, and methods to correct the situation.
- Display showing features of soils such as color, structure, texture.
- A display or journal of Minnesota plants, insects, animals, birds or fish. Include pictures or drawings and information on habits, foods and shelter needs.
- Display showing erosion control practices such as minimum tillage, terraces, contour strips, grassed waterways, field windbreak, water control structures, etc.



FISHING SPORTS

Premiums: Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1
CLASS 3000 — Fishing Sports

Lot

- 10 – Grades 3-5

Exhibit Suggestions:

- Fish identification. Describe the habitat and food needs of selected Minnesota fish; develop a panel display explaining the life history of a fish; create a model or exhibit identifying the parts of a fish.
- Fishing Knots. Identify how and where each knot is used; fishing equipment which is made or repaired such as lures, fishing rods and reels, ice fishing rig, or other fishing equipment.
- Safety practices and techniques that are related to fishing or boating.
- Examples of how water quality affects the fish ecosystem.

4-H and FFA FLOWER GARDENING

Premiums: Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1
CLASS 3100 — Flower Gardening

Lot

- 10 – Grades 3-5
- 20 – Grades 6-8
- 30 – Grades 9+

Requirements:

- Members are responsible for plant care during the fair.
- Flowers must be exhibited in uniform containers with one cut flower or stem in each container.
- Label each container according to kind or variety.
- Live plant material will be accepted if it can be maintained in a fresh condition with ease. If not, adaptation such as photographs in place of live material may be made.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- One variety of annual flower (three stems); one variety of hardy perennials (one stem).
- One variety of summer flowering bulbs (one stem), collection of three different perennial garden flowers (one stem or stalk of each), collection of four different annual garden flowers (one stem of each), single stem of one of the following: glad spike, rose or dahlia.
- Flower bouquet or arrangement on any theme.
- Display of dried flowers with a card explaining drying method.
- My Flower Garden - exhibit on poster board, not to exceed 22 x 28". Include a plan of the garden drawn to scale, the correct variety name and pictures (or photographs) of the flowers grown. Be prepared to discuss the process from soil preparation to blooming.
- Educational Exhibit showing the principles of propagation or reproduction, nutrition, culture and physiology (how a plant lives and grows).

FOOD AND NUTRITION

Premiums: Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1
CLASS 3200 — Food and Nutrition

Lot

- 10 – Grades 3-5
- 20 – Grades 6-8
- 30 – Grades 9+

Requirements:

- Exhibit may be food items and/or displays.
- Exhibitors should be prepared to discuss with the judge, references and information sources, nutritional values, methods, menu, costs, etc., as appropriate to that exhibit.
- The exhibit may be a poster, mobile, three-dimensional display, scrapbook, balance beam, charts, journals, pictures, slides, equipment, supplies, photographs, puppet play, skit, judging comparison, taped interview, file of ideas, research study, etc.
- Pictures, food models, plaster, plastic, papier-maché, etc., are preferable to perishable foods in an educational exhibit. Perishable foods should be used only if they add to or help explain the educational exhibit. If perishable food is a part of the exhibit, the food is to be brought just for judging.
- Exhibits containing perishable foods, which will be discarded, must include a colored photograph of the food. The photograph should be taken prior to the fair and attached to the display. This photograph and a 3x5 note card listing nutrition information and the recipe will be displayed as the exhibit instead of the food.
- Food exhibits should consist of a representative sample; for example 4 muffins, cookies, brownies; 1 loaf of bread.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- One serving of a nutritious food (vegetable or fruit dish, snack, bread, dairy, etc.). Include 8-1/2 x 11 poster showing nutritional value, recipe, and a photo of the food.
- Study of nutrients needed for yourself or someone else, using the dietary guidelines and Food Guide Pyramid.
- Make a food or fitness plan for yourself or someone else and show how it relates to nutritional and energy needs. (Example: an athlete on a volleyball team, a teen who doesn't have a lot of time).
- Adapt a recipe(s) to show healthier ingredient choices.
- Study of how physical fitness and/or food choices are related to disease (ex.: cancer, heart disease, osteoporosis, diabetes, etc.)
- Study of labels from similar food items, comparing important nutrient content like fat, fiber and sugar.
- Exhibit showing food and/or kitchen safety.
- Nutrition/food science experiment.

CLASS 3300 — Food Preservation

Lot

- 10 – Grades 3-5
- 20 – Grades 6-8
- 30 – Grades 9+

Requirements:

- Exhibitor must be enrolled in food & Nutrition project.
- All recipes, procedures and times followed must be according to current USDA and/or University of Minnesota home food preservation publications.
- Containers should be labeled with a 2" x 3" label with the following information; name, county, product, processing time and method, and date product was packed.
- Jars should be heat-tempered glass canning jars.
- All jars should be sealed. Leave screw bands on two piece jar lids. Jellies and jams should be covered with lids.

- Use pint jars for fruit, vegetables and fish; one-half pint jars for jams and jellies; one quart jars for pickled products.
- Jellies and jams must be processed in boiling water bath according to USDA and/or University of Minnesota food preservation publications, available through the Extension Office. Note: Paraffin is not acceptable.
- No artificial food coloring should be added to entries.
- Dried foods may be stored in glass jars, self-sealing plastic bags or airtight plastic bags. The quantity of dried foods should be: fruits and vegetables - 1/2 cup or more of each, herbs - 1/4 cup of each in whole leaf form, meat - 6 strips.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- Two jars of different fruits or different vegetables.
- Different jams, jellies, preserves, low-sugar spreads (no frozen).
- Different type pickled products (fermented or added acid, including pickles, sauerkraut, relishes, salsa).
- Two jars different meats, poultry and/or fish. (Fish must be in pint jars.)
- Two different dried vegetables, dried fruits.
- Six different dried herbs.
- Six strips of beef or venison jerky.
- Food science experiment or educational display.

FOREST RESOURCES

Premiums: Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1
CLASS 3400 — Forest Resources

Lot

- 10 – Grades 3-5
- 20 – Grades 6-8
- 30 – Grades 9+

Requirements:

- Exhibits should be mounted on cardboard or other sturdy material.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- Collection of leaves or needles with twigs, identified with their common name. Common name should be printed near the identified leaf/needle.
- Photographic display of forest products - include the name of the product/use to identify the photograph.
- Display showing tree growth; annual ring cross-sections; make a seed collection.
- Prepare a report with drawings about your favorite tree -- include name of tree, drawings or pictures of tree, facts and uses of the tree, and other appropriate information.
- Display showing layers of the forest; renewable versus non-renewable resources; forestry careers; leaf and twig identification; taxonomic keys; tree road maps.
- Display showing forest succession; tree and forest measurements; fire's effect on the forest; how trees grow; forest types; harvesting methods; entomology of the forest; pathology of the forest.
- Display showing forest products, including maple syrup production; wood products; Christmas trees or other forest resources (recreation, wildlife, etc.).
- Display showing specialized woodland management, including shelterbelts/windbreaks and urban forestry.

**FRUIT**

Premiums: Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1

CLASS 3500 — Fruit**Lot**

- 10 – Grades 3-5

Exhibit Suggestions:

- Display showing a comparison of several varieties of the same fruit (labeled); display using a branch to illustrate proper pruning of fruit trees and explaining the process; illustrate the many uses of fruits (fresh, jams, juices, cooking, baking, salads and recipes); illustrate the use of fruits as natural dyes.
- Educational display illustrating diseases (actual specimens) or insects (actual specimens) and methods of control.

**Requirements:**

- Include a 3x5 index card listing the varieties of fruit, name and club of exhibitor.
- If exhibiting fruit samples, exhibitor should bring 6 items of one variety of fruit.

GEOLOGY

Premiums: Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1
CLASS 3600 — Geology

Lot

- 10 – Grades 3-5
- 20 – Grades 6-8

Requirements:

- Attach specimens securely to a backboard and display in a glass-topped case of the same model as used by the entomologists. Specimens should be approximately 2" x 2". Label each specimen using the label described on page seven of the Geology Manual. Size of label may be reduced to fit display case, if needed. Attach specimens so they will not fall if case is set on its edge. Member must have a knowledge of how specimens are identified as to rock or fossil type.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- Display of birthstones, a rock plate, or an egg carton collection (see geology bulletin), six silly silicates.
- Rocks, minerals or fossils from within Minnesota or on a definite theme such as metamorphism, weathering, quartz minerals, ores, or a theme of your own choosing.
- Polished rock types used to make decorative items such as paperweights and jewelry; include an unpolished specimen of each rock type.
- Educational exhibit showing the "science hows and whys" dealing with the principles of geology and natural earth sciences.



GEOSPATIAL

- Exhibits may include community maps, comparison of GPS units, ways in which GIS and GPS programs are used, and reviews of software and resources available.

Note: Geographic Information System and Global Positioning System (GIS/GPS) programs allow 4-H members to explore science, engineering and technology and combine to form the content for the Geospatial project area. Appropriate work in this area can include investigations into the history of GIS and/or GPS, current uses, equipment and software and more. Development of GIS maps that incorporate waypoints and trails created through GPS are encouraged.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- Any item made by the member using the techniques of knitting, crocheting, embroidery and crewel, counted cross stitch, needlepoint, hardanger, hand quilting, weaving, applique, latch hook, tatting, other.
- Consumer Product Analysis: Comparison and evaluation of materials, supplies or accessories used for a needle arts technique.
- Historical/Cultural Study: Story, poster, or display about a needle arts heirloom from your family or local history museum. Exhibit must include information about how item should be preserved.

PHOTOGRAPHY

(You may be docked a ribbon placing if you bring a framed exhibit.)**
- Enlargements may range in size from 5x7" to 11x14" and should be mounted with appropriate size matting.
- If the exhibit is an enlargement or has been enhanced, the original photo(s) should be attached to the exhibit.

Exhibit Suggestions:

- A photo story of 5 to 7 photos.
- Four to six with a common theme or subject (e.g. seasons, action photos, close-ups of people, "best" etc.).
- An enlargement.
- Slide show with an accompanying written script. Slides should be in plastic slide sheets.
- Exhibit of advanced photo skills such as: photo journalism, portrait, commercial, or close-up photography, advanced darkroom techniques.
- Digitally enhanced photos.

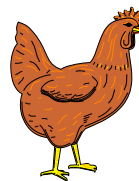

Poultry testing must be done **EACH** year.
Copy of pullorum certificate must be turned in to the exhibit building. Please be considerate and clean your cages.

Chickens, turkeys, and game birds at exhibitions, except baby poultry, **must be individually identified with a leg or wing band.**

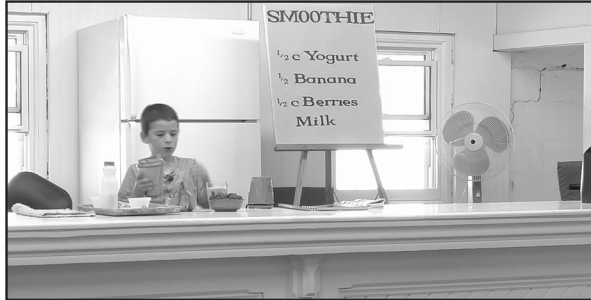
